Issue: Are Natural World Heritage sites a universal common good?

Established in 1945, UNESCO is a United Nations committee that focuses on science, education, culture, and communication. Its objective is to protect world heritage sites but also to promote international collaboration in the fields of education and science, making it a crucial force for preserving our culture and natural areas.

The Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela is a country with a growing population of +1,90% every year and, with this perspective of demographic growth, we need to create enough lodging for the population in order avoid a real estate crisis.
